

PASSIONTIDE MOVIE NIGHT - SATURDAY, APRIL 5TH

PASSIONTIDE - THE VEILING OF CRUCIFIXES AND STATUES

The mini-liturgical season of Passiontide occurs during the last two weeks of Lent. The practice of veiling statues and crucifixes follows from the Gospel of Passion Sunday, in which the Scribes and Pharisees are ready to put the Lord to death, so He hides Himself from them. His hour has not yet come, but as that hour draws near, we hide Him from our view by veiling his crucifixes and the images of saints in the church. You may also observe this at home. Midway through the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night, the images will be unveiled in observance of the Resurrection of the LORD.

IS IT TRUE THAT "YOUNG PEOPLE HAVE TO WORK HARD DURING THE DAY AND REQUIRE FREE TIME FOR REST."

How reasonable this sounds, yet if acted upon, it would leave the world a religious wilderness, for it is not by the leisured that the Church's work is done. Moreover, is it not true that the high spirited young give their free hours to more or less disordered amusement than to genuine rest? In such an alternation between a day of toil and evening of pleasure, it is very easy to drift into a practical materialism, which, after a few years, leaves hearts without an ideal, eating themselves out for the youth which has prematurely fled, taking with it the only things they had been taught to prize. And things may end even more unhappily. Does not St. John Chrysostom say that he had never succeeded in persuading himself that anyone could achieve salvation who had never done anything for the salvation of his neighbor? Infinitely wiser would it be to urge young people to five to the Lord, in a legionary membership, the first fruits of that free time. Those first fruits will inspire the whole life and keep the heart, and face too, serene and young. And there is still left an abundance of time for recreation, doubly enjoyed because doubly earned. THE COMMEMORATION OF THE SEVEN SORROWS OF THE BVM

Friday, April 11th. The Friday before Holy Week is historically celebrated as a commemoration of the interior martyrdom of the Blessed Virgin Mary. We anticipate Good Friday in advance meditating upon the Seven Swords that pierced the heart of the Immaculate Virgin Mary.

THE FOUR PASSIONS OF HOLY WEEK

In the Traditional Latin Mass, all four gospel accounts of the Passion of the Lord are proclaimed during the Masses of Holy Week beginning with the Passion according to St. Matthew on Palm Sunday; the Passion according to St. Luke on Wednesday; and finally the Passion according to St. John on Good Friday.

HOLY WEEK AND EASTER SCHEDULE

WHAT IS TENEBRAE?

The word 'tenebrae' refers to darkness. Tenebrae is the traditional nocturnal office of psalms and readings prayed during the Triduum. A hearse of candles is lit (a singular triangular candelabra of 15 candles), each of which is extinguished one by one at the end of each of 14 psalms. The readings each day in the first Nocturne are from the Lamentations of Jeremiah; the second Nocturne from St. Augustine; the third Nocturne from St. Paul. Monsignor Pierre Batiffol writes: "And then came the 'triduum,' the last three ferias of the Holy Week, and the office assumes the amplitude which characterizes the most solemn anniversaries." (History of the Roman Breviary, 1912. p. 92). It is believed that the Roman Office of the Triduum is so ancient, that it "already existed at Rome in the sixth century in much the same state as now" (ibid. fn.3, p. 92). Traditionally, Masses have been celebrated in the daytime and Tenebrae at night: "The office commenced at midnight...At the night office of Maundy Thursday, celebrated at S. John Lateran, the basilica was lit up as usual: but on Good Friday, when the office was sung at Holy Cross in Jerusalem, all the lights were extinguished one after another, so that at the end of the Benedictus only one remained alight, which was then hid behind the altar until the next day...in token that the Light of the world was extinguished, Christ being dead, and that darkness was upon the face of the whole earth. The night office of Easter Eve was celebrated in the dark, only one lamp being suffered to be lit for the reader" (p. 93). In 1955, the Holy Week services were reformed, and Tenebrae switched places with the Masses and services at the altar which had previously been celebrated in the daytime. We will celebrate Tenebrae at 8 am during the Triduum. Thursday, Friday, and Saturday morning will be the full Latin office lasting approx two and a half hours on Holy Thursday and Good Friday; and two hours on Holy Saturday. Booklets to follow along in Latin/English will be provided.

FAST AND ABSTINENCE LAWS AND DISCIPLINES

The current law of the Church obliges those age 14 and over to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent. Those age 18 through 59 are also obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and **Good Friday**.

Fasting is defined as one full meal and two other meals which, when combined are less than a full meal. Recommended: 2 oz in AM; 8 oz in PM.

The former practice and discipline in place in 1962 obliged those age 7 and over to full abstinence from meat on all Fridays of the year, Ash Wednesday, **Holy Saturday**, and the Vigil of Christmas (Christmas Eve).

Likewise, formerly, partial abstinence (meat permitted once a day at the principle meal): all the days of Lent, the Ember Days of Wednesday and Saturday, and the Vigils of Pentecost and the Assumption.

The former law for fasting applied to those age 21 through 59. Fasting was to be done on all days of Lent (except Sundays) from Ash Wednesday inclusive, Ember Days, and the Vigils of Christmas, Pentecost and the Assumption.

THE PASCHAL BLESSINGS OF FOOD: (EASTER BASKETS)

The Roman Ritual includes various blessings for Easter which represent the foods (or foods containing festive ingredients) that the faithful traditionally abstained from during the 40 days of Lent: lamb, eggs, bread, new produce, any victual, and oil. Parishioners and guests are welcome to bring your Easter Baskets with these items to be blessed on Easter Sunday morning.

NO COFFEE/DONUTS/LUNCH SERVED ON EASTER SUNDAY

The parish grounds will be closed after the conclusion of the 11 am Mass.

NINE TUESDAYS OF ST. ANTHONY OF PADUA

Beginning Tuesday of Holy Week, April 15th and concluding Pentecost Tuesday, June 10th. The Feast of St. Anthony falls this year on Ember Friday, June 13th. Many favors have been obtained by those who have made this Novena. Look up the playlist for the Nine Tuesdays of St. Anthony for archived weekly videos on the parish YouTube channel. Here are the rules:

- 1) Recite for nine consecutive Tuesdays the prayer or prayers you find most appropriate (provided in the church and on the website)
- 2) Endeavor to imitate his virtues.
- 3) Receive within the period of the Novena, if possible, the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist.
- 4) Promise alms for St. Anthony's Bread for the poor, if you have the means.
