FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN

What comes to mind when you think about the Ascension? The image in the popular mind may be that of the Lord departing from the earth, rising up into the clouds from the Mount of Olives. Let's look at this from a different perspective:

Imagine the scene, looking down from the heavens to the earth. What was the perspective of the angels? When God created all things, both visible and invisible, angels were among the invisible creation. They witnessed the creation of all material being. They mourned the fall of the angels who rebelled against God and chose darkness over light. They mourned the fall of man. They served God before His heavenly throne awaiting the fulfillment of all things and preparing for it. The Psalms were composed, the Temple was built, the beautiful liturgies of the Temple and the Synagogue developed. A kingdom was built upon earth as a sign of God's sovereignty over all creation. But the heavenly kingdom was not open to God's greatest creation which was man. It was a kingdom populated by angels and it was incomplete. The time had now come on this great day for the kingdom to finally receive it's King. God the Father had reigned in pure Spirit upon his throne preparing all creation for this moment.

Now, Christ the King ascends, body and soul, in His divinity and in His humanity, through the clouds, to the blare of trumpets, taking with Him the just souls who have waited in Hades since the death of Adam. The psalms and the prophets speak of this triumph.

Among the Church Fathers, St Augustine, Pope St. Leo the Great, and Dionysius the Areopagite did not focus on Christ leaving us. They focused on the triumphal entry of Christ through the heavenly gates, with a train of souls following Him. They identified this feast as the coronation of Christ as King of heaven and earth, taking His rightful place on His throne at the right hand of the Father. Psalm 47 was cited by Dionysius as the song of the celestial hierarchy of angels. The Powers called out: "God mounts His throne to shouts of joy..." and the Principalities answered: "... a blare of trumpets for the Lord." The Dominions inquired: "Who is this king of glory?" and the Thrones answered: "It is the Lord, the mighty, the valiant in battle. He is the King of Glory!" The Ascension is truly a triumphal feast, the final celebration of the Paschal Mystery and Christ's breaking the kingdom of death.

To fully understand what we celebrate this week, we must understand that our true home is not upon this earth, but in heaven. The Roman Catechism says that He "ascended into heaven in order to teach us to follow Him in mind and heart. He teaches and instructs us that though dwelling on earth, we should raise ourselves in desire to heaven, confessing that we are pilgrims and strangers on the earth, seeking a country and that we are fellow citizens with the saints, and the domestics of God, for, says the Apostle, our conversation is in heaven" (Part I, art. 6).

Fasting Brothers

in conjunction with Seven Sisters Apostolate

Fasting Brothers are men who commit to fasting one day a week in conjunction with their parish's Seven Sisters group (cf. WEARE: SevenSistersApostolate.org) exclusively for the intention of their pastor. Sunday is excluded as it is the Lord's day and thus unsuited to penance.

WHAT

Fasting Brothers each commit to a day of the week (other than Sunday) to offer their fasts in union with the Eucharistic Holy WE DO: Hour of a Seven Sister for their priest. Each man chooses what type of fast he will offer, e.g. no food all day, only bread and water, not eating until 3 p.m.—whatever he discerns from the Holy Spirit. It should be sacrificial.

On the specific day of the week to which he has committed, a Fasting Brother offers his fast solely for the intentions of the pastor. These include: the priest's sanctification in general, specific spiritual and temporal needs, and his ever-deepening devotion to Our Lady, Mother of Priests. These mirror the Seven Sisters' intentions during their Eucharistic Holy Hours. It is also encouraged that the Fasting Brothers offer their fasts for the priest's increased devotion to St. Joseph, model of fortitude and purity.

Holy Mother Church is under attack like never before. **Our priests** daily face the brunt of Satan's brutal assault. Like officers MATTERS: bravely leading the charge into battle, our priests need the support of the entire Church Militant. Jesus tells us of how to fight the most powerful devils: "But this kind is not cast out but by prayer and fasting" (Matthew 17:21). The Seven Sisters provide the prayer and the Fasting Brothers complement it with their fasts. We need both!

TO START:

Identify six men in your parish who are willing to put themselves on the line physically and spiritually for your pastor. Get a commitment from someone for each day of the week (except Sunday) and invite them to make a one-year commitment. Choose a solemnity on which to renew your commitment each year (such as the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart or Solemnity of Saint Joseph). Let your pastor and your local Seven Sisters group know when you're underway! Godspeed!
