PANCAKE SUNDAY IN GYM AFTER THE 10:30 MASS TODAY

FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN "Quinquagesima Sunday"

We arrive at the "50th day" before Easter signified by this Sunday, although in reality, we are just a few days away from Quadragesima (the 40 Days). Ash Wednesday is officially called Day IV in Quinquagesima. The nearness of the Lenten fast informs the spirituality of these next three days because at the same time we are preparing for Lent, the secular world is focused only on Carnival aka Mardi Gras. *Mardi Gras* is literally "Fat Tuesday" during which fat is consumed the day before the fast; whereas *Carnevale* is a longer period in which meat (carne) is consumed before the Lenten abstinence and by extension all things of the flesh come to be indulged by those who remain unaware of the holiness of this time.

Due to the occurrence of so much indulgence of the flesh, the practice of the 40 Hour Devotion was introduced in the 16th century during this time of Quinquagesima. Dom Gueranger writes: "How far from being true children of Abraham are those Christians who spend this and the two following days in intemperance and dissipation, because Lent is soon to be upon us! ...a joyous shrovetide is not to be altogether reprobated, provided the Christian sentiment of the approaching holy season of Lent be strong enough to check the evil tendency of corrupt nature" (<u>The Liturgical Year</u>, Vol. 4: Septuagesima, pg. 181;182).

What is a Catholic's response? Adoration and reparation! I encourage all those reading this article to try to spend some time with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament outside of Mass these next three days before Ash Wednesday. My hope is that our parish could add times of adoration this year and I apologize that we are not ready to do so in these next three days. The object for adoration during this particular time before Lent is "to offer the divine Majesty some compensation for the sins of men, and at the very time when the world (is) busiest in deserving His anger, to appease it by the sight of His own Son, the Mediator between heaven and earth" (Gueranger p. 184).

I can announce to you, however, that the Pastoral Council was enthusiastic about holding a "24 hours for the Lord" this Lent and we are scheduling it for Friday night, March 22nd with All Night Adoration before the 7th Rosary Walk the following day (Saturday), to be followed by the Solemn Consecration of the Parish to the Immaculate Heart of Mary on Sunday, March 24th during which parishioners will be encouraged to make their personal consecrations to Jesus through Mary; as well as on the Feast of the Annunciation on Monday, Marcy 25th. If you have or can make an opportunity, spend some time these next three days making a holy hour before the Blessed Sacrament, either in the tabernacle or better yet, exposed in the monstrance to be gazed upon face to face. That would be a generous preparation for the holy 40 days upon which we embark this Ash Wednesday.

Laws of Days of Abstinence: Current Practice

- Begins on one's 14th birthday.
- Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent.
- Obliges abstention from flesh meat.

Laws of Days of Penance: Current Practice

- Applies to all the Faithful.
- Lent and Fridays outside of Lent.

Laws of Days of Fast: Current Practice

• Applies to everyone aged 18 to 59, inclusive.

- One full meal permitted and two other meals may be
- taken which, when combined, are less than a full meal.
- Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

The obligation to do penance is lifted on Fridays which are also celebrated as a solemnity. The following is a list of the Solemnities in the New Rite which can fall on a Friday:

- January 1: Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God
- January 6: Solemnity of the Epiphany
- March 19: Solemnity of St. Joseph, Spouse of Mary
- March 25: Solemnity of the Annunciation
- June 24: Solemnity of St. John the Baptist
- June 29: Solemnity of Ss. Peter and Paul
- August 15: Solemnity of the Assumption
- November 1: Solemnity of All Saints
- December 8: Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception
- December 25: Solemnity of Christmas
- Principal patron of a place (city, state, nation)
- Dedication of a particular church and the anniversary

• The Title, founder, or principal patron of a religious order or congregation

The Law of the Eucharistic Fast: Current Legislation

Under the New Code of Canon Law, the Fast for Holy Communion is one hour before the reception of the Holy Eucharist. Those who are able to maintain the previous discipline of the three-hour fast are still encouraged to do so.

Laws of Days of Abstinence: The Discipline of 1962

• Applies on one's 7th birthday.

• Complete Abstinence: all Fridays of the year, Ash Wednesday, Holy Saturday, and the Vigil of Christmas.

• Partial Abstinence (meat and soup or gravy made from meat permitted once a day at the principle meal): all the days of Lent, the Ember Days of Wednesday and Saturday, and the Vigils of Pentecost and the Assumption.

• Abstinence from meat is dispensed on Holy Days of Obligation.

Laws of Fast: The Discipline of 1962

• Applies for those aged 21 to 59, inclusive.

Days of Lent from Ash Wednesday inclusive, Ember Days, and Vigils of Christmas, Pentecost, and the Assumption.
One full meal permitted and two other meals may be taken which and two

other meals may be taken which, when combined, are less than a full meal.

The Law of the Eucharistic Fast: The Discipline of 1962

The complete fast from all food and drink (except water or medicine) for three hours before the reception of Holy Communion. Those who are able to maintain the midnight fast, which was the previous discipline, are still encouraged to do so.
