## **FROM THE DESK OF FR ERIC ANDERSEN**

Reflecting upon the recent fire at Notre Dame Cathedral, my gut reaction is that it is really beside the point to determine the natural cause: this gut reaction and apparently that of others, is that the tragedy comes as a divine warning. The Cathedral was not destroyed, but seriously wounded. It is a sign of the Church in our times. She cannot be destroyed because Our Lord has promised that the gates of Hades would not prevail against her, but she is seriously wounded and has been hemorrhaging for some decades.

Still fresh from the centenary of Our Lady of Fatima, we can recall Our Lady's warning that unless men stop offending God, a worse war will happen. We must stop offending God for He is already so offended. We then counter that warning and every warning with the mercy of God reaching out to us with an outpouring of generosity. Today's feast of the Divine Mercy finds its beginnings in the 1930s at about the same time when Sr. Lucia of Fatima began to write her memoirs and reveal the secrets of Fatima for the first time.

The Church is wounded in and by her members, but not mortally so. There is always hope. The Holy Spirit is a giver of supernatural hope. In the darkest of times, there is always a light that dispels the gloom and that light is Jesus Christ. We celebrate this at Easter by means of a bonfire and an enormous candle on Holy Saturday. Our hope is always that we can turn things around, individually and collectively. It happens one person at a time. A homeless man manages to transition into housing. A deserted expectant mother finds a loving offer of help and she decides to keep her child. A despairing person contemplating suicide hears that interior voice of courage and conviction to cling to life.

Have you ever considered that the Rosary you pray today serves as an instrument of hope for someone you may never meet? Likewise, the Divine Mercy chaplet was given so that even the most hardened sinner may be turned back to the Lord. You do not need to know who will benefit from your prayers today. You do not even need to be the type of person who prays regularly in order for your prayers to benefit someone else. If you were only to pray once in your very life and it was today, you could turn the tide for yourself if this were to be your last day on this earth; you could also help to turn around the life of someone else just because you decided to be generous to God for 7 minutes today while praying the Divine Mercy Chaplet.

Today is a feast to proclaim the mercy of God and the forgiveness of sins for all sinners. Jesus said, "I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the Fount of My Mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the divine floodgates through which graces flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. . . . Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy" (Diary 699).

Come and give to God one hour today outside of Mass. Offer it with all the generosity you are capable of. Our world needs mercy. I need mercy. You need mercy. Let us come together to pray for God's Divine Mercy today at 3 pm – the Hour of Mercy. If you would like to make an afternoon of it, stay for Adoration after the Holy Hour and pray Vespers with us at 5 pm followed by Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Let us implore the mercy of God for the Church in France, the Christians in Sri Lanka, and all the good people who live right here in Portland, in our neighborhood of St. Stephen's.

Should one forget to form the intention of making reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, it may be formed at the next Confession, the occasion to go to confession being taken at the first opportunity."
